

Another Eclipse

"The sun is 400 times bigger than the moon, but it is also 400 times farther away from us–a glorious cosmic coincidence that has the moon precisely covering the sun's face when the two align. The result is a total solar eclipse" (Katie Peek, Scientific American, Mar 2024).

On April 8th there will be a solar eclipse crossing North America. And, in certain areas of the United States people will be able to see a *total* solar eclipse where the moon will completely cover the sun, and darkness will appear during the day! Remember the solar eclipse of August 2017? Casper was able to witness a total eclipse because we were in the path of totality, so maybe you've already witnessed this unique event.



However, scientist have predicted this year's eclipse to be a bit different than the last one. For example, in April this year the moon will be closer to the sun compared to its position relative to the sun in August of 2017, which is expected to create a wider path, and longer period, of totality this time. As a result, even though Casper is not in the path of totality, folks in our area should be able to see at least a partial solar eclipse starting around 11:30 AM and ending around 2 PM. Be sure to wear proper eye protection while observing!



It's fitting that during our spring bird migration, Will Robinson will be our guest speaker to inform us about the migration of the giant honey bees (*Apis dorsata*) in Thailand. And just like the ungulates and birds more familiar to us here, the honey bees travel the same route each year, following the food sources as they become available across the land.

What started as a sabbatical for Robinson, has turned into four trips, in 2009, 2010, 2016, and 2023. On the latest trip that ended in December of 2023, Robinson and his wife, Maria Katherman, were working with the World Wildlife Fund to protect the migratory bee stopover site he identified on their first trip. On his original trip, Robinson soon found that what appeared to be large hives were in fact large clumps of bees hanging from trees as "bivouacs" while they rested during migration. And just as Wyoming has learned the importance of preserving migratory routes for mule deer, he feels the same approach should be applied to bees.

Similar to the experience many of us have had observing the Sandhill Cranes or large flocks of geese, Robinson shared that "It's absolutely incredible to have an entire group of 50,000 bees fly right over your head. The adrenaline rush is like nothing I've ever experienced. It is soul stirring."

Robinson's presentations are always excellent, and we hope that you may join us for this free talk on April 11, 2024 at 7 p.m., at the Izaak Walton Clubhouse, at 4205 Fort Caspar Road.

UPCOMING FIELD TRIPS

If you have questions, please call Stacey Scott at 307-262-0055, I will post field trips and any changes under "Events" on the website, murieaudubon.org. Also, I am looking for more ideas for field trips. Let me know if you have any ideas. Some people have suggested a trip to Texas or Arizona or a trip to Central America. If enough people are interested, I can look into that kind of trip.

Saturday, April 13 - Meet at 9:00 at the Game and Fish Parking Lot for a trip to Goldeneye and the area around the 33 Mile Rd. There should be early ducks on Goldeneye, and we should be able to find Sandhill Cranes on the hay fields. We should be back by noon.

April and early May - I am monitoring several Sage-grouse leks to count the strutting birds, and would like company. I cannot plan very many days in advance because I need dry, passable roads. Some of the leks are near Bates Creek Reservoir, and we won't get back from those trips until nearer noon. The ones on the Two-Bar Ranch winter pastures are much closer, and I will get back from those about 8:00 AM. Anyone interested ought to call me at 307-262-0055.

May - Every Tuesday in May we will meet at 8:00 AM at the Platte River shelter at EKW for a walk around the park. This should cover the migration and the transition to the nesting birds.

Saturday, May 11 - Walk around EKW. We will meet near the Platte River Shelter at 8:00 AM. If the birding is good it might take us a couple of hours.

I would love to go birding in Goshen Hole, anyone interested should call me and we will set a time to go see some interesting migrants.

Saturday, May 18 and Saturday, June 22 - Mindfulness Birding at EKW: We'll begin with a guided walk, framing birding as a form of nature-focused meditation. Then, we'll integrate mindful exercises designed to enrich our connection with the environment, with birds serving as the conduit for introspection.

MINDFULNESS BIRDING



Mindful birding is an approach to birdwatching that focuses on being fully present and engaged in the activity, with a heightened awareness of the natural world and oneself. It combines the principles of mindfulness with the hobby of birdwatching, creating a deeper and more meaningful connection with nature.

At its core, mindfulness involves paying attention to the present moment without judgment. In the context of birding, this means being fully immersed in the experience of observing birds, noticing their behavior, movements, and the environment around them without getting distracted or lost in thought.

Consider practicing mindful birding with us on Saturday, May 18 and Saturday, June 22 at EKW. Times will be posted.

BIRD IDENTIFICATION CLASS
